

What is your current occupation?

What are some of the skills and lessons that the IASC has taught you?

I'm from a small rural town in central Illinois where there were fewer than 100 total students in my entire high school. When I was a freshman I wasn't allowed to join Student Council because the Advisor at the time said I wasn't, "student council material." Two years later, I was elected state President and had an entire world of opportunities, connections, and friendships open up to me. I share that to explain that the biggest lesson the IASC taught me is that if you have a dream and a vision, you can do anything. I truly believe that and IASC was the organization that proved it to me. 
