#### THE IASC HEADS WEST

Sixty-six Illinois Delegates left Chicago on June 20 around 5:50 p.m. to attend the National Association of Student Councils Convention (NASC) at Hurst, Texas.

The delegates' adventures include Yellowstone National Park; Salt Lake City; Hurst, Texas (Nationals); Silver Dollar City; and the Shepherd of the Hills pageant.

The Illinois Delgation arrived at Hurst, Texas Sunday evening at 6:30, registered and met their host families. They went home to get ready for the evening's program.

The First General Session Opening Ceremony began at 8:45, Les Smith, NASC/NASAA Advisory Committee presented the gaval to Ray Oujesky, 1978 NASC Conference Chairperson. Martha O'Brien, Student Council President of Trinity H.S.,

iless, Texas, gave the invocation. Then ame the 1978 Presentation of the States with flag bearers, L.D. Bell Raiderettes. Bob Richards, Olympic Gold Medal winner, gave the address which presented the theme, "Accepting a Challenge."

State meetings came first on Monday morning, Then the Second General Session convened, Douglas Hunt, Associate Executive Director, NASSP Spoke, Eugene Miller, President of NASSP, introduced the NASC/NASAA Advisory Committee. Oscar Newton, Jr., Vice President and Director of Sales. American General Life Insurance Company, gave the major address

Student Leadership Workshops and State Officers Workshops were in the afternoon. Illinois had four discussion group leaders: Juan Aguilar, Kelvyn Park H.S.; Amy Barry, Grayslake Community H.S.; Morrie Smith, Kaneland Senior H.S.; and Shelly Sparks, Mattoon, H.S.

For the evening's activities delegateswent to Cowtown Rodeo, Fort Worth Texas. After the rodeo "Mr. Phil" Guliuzza, Louisiana's State Executive Secretary,led a sing-along, and told his story of the "warm Fuzzies."

State meetings were held Tuesday morning. "Mr. Phil" came to Illinois' session and thanked the delegates for their spirit. He said that last night would not have been possible without Illinois.

At the Third General Session, William Bailey gave the address on crime and vandalism. Then Educational and Social Issue Sessions convened.

Tuesday evening found the delegates at Six Flags over Texas.


On Wednesday the delegates went to Large Group Specialized Workshops on school spirit, communications, and problem solving.

The Fourth General Session included a film-Fat City. It was about our search for pleasure, with eight computerized projectors and sterphonic soundtrack, featuring skills, films and music by top artists in Europe, Canada, and America.

A banquet was offered at the Fairmont Hotel in the evening Earl Reum, Coordinator, gave the address. Following the Address was a surprize movie of events from the past week. The finale was a computer dance. The "Dallas Force: provided the music.

Illinois had the second largest delegation with one-hundred-and-one delegates. Texas was the largest.

The delegates arrived at St. Louis, MO. around 5:00 a.m. July 1. The trip was terminated at Chicago.

# Leadership is a Learning Experience

NOTES FROM THE CHAIR

During the coming year each of us will have a need to learn to work with individuals and groups, to communicate effectively, to run a successful meeting, to evaluate endeavors, and to accept and delegate responsibilities—to become better leaders.

There are not very many "born leaders"; rather, many individuals are born with the potential to be leaders. The IASC exists to provide opportunities for young leaders to develope leadership skills. The IASC offers:

1. Constitutional Convention (Sept. 23-24, 1978)

Students will participate in the rewriting of the IASC Constitution. They will learn the importance of a constitution, the basic structure of a constitution, and the language of a constitution.

2. Workshops

There are workshops offered throughout the year designed for: up-coming leaders (Freshman-Sophomore workshops), advisors, discussion group leaders (Materials workshops), experienced leaders (Advanced workshops), and for leaders who want to get a head start for the coming school year (McKendree Summer Workshop.)

3. Conference on Student Views

The conference provides students across the state with an opportunity to debate controversial issues. The debators must research their topics ,plan an argument (pro or con), and then present it.

4. Published materials to help councils across the state keep in-formed.

\*THE REPORTER passes on valuable ideas and information which can benefit all student council organizations. At the same time, student councils can inform other councils of their activities by writing to the editor.

\*Many councils have put together publications on fund raising, student exchange, student rights, roles of officers, etc., which are available to you by con tacting one of the IASC Executive Board Members.

5. The Annual IASC State Convention

Here students have an opportunity to take on new leadership positions. A student can run for a state office, can become a discussion group leader, or a member of one of several committees which are essential to the success of this convention. Over a Thousand students from around the state witness and participate in a convention similar to many national conventions held by professional organizations each year.

These are just some of the activities which IASC makes available to you and members of your student body who you identify. Because LEADERSHIP IS A LEARNING EXPER—IENCE we hope that you will take advantage of these opportunities to develope needed leadership skills.

#### Other Examples:


A student council may have some used piece of equipment to sell or may want to buy some (i.e. riser).

A council may wish to arrange some student exchanges with schools that are working on particular problems similar to theirs.





#### Become a Leader at McKendree!

Under the direction of Gary ZumMallen, current IASC Workshop Director, the twenty-seventh annual leadership workshops began July 24 at McKendree College. Three one week long sessions were offered.

Bewildered delegates arrived on Monday afternoon, not knowing what challenges and situations would arise within the next four days. Delegates first went to Lower Deneen for registration. Room assignments, keys and group folders were distributed by staff to the delegates upon registration.

After registration, and dinner, workshops began. Delegates divided into clubs which were named and given a job to do. Pictures were taken of these various clubs. The general session came next. Mr. ZumMallen welcomed everyone to the workshop. Then he introduced the Senior Counselor and the Junior Counselors (J.C.'s).

Ed Phelps, Executive Secretary of the IASC and Consultant for the workshops, spoke briefly on leadership and upcoming events of the week. Delegates were then given cards which had three songs on them, instructed to go outside, and start humming until they found everyone that was humming the same song. The delegates then sat in these groups and gave factual

information about themselves. They did this for all three songs except the last one, which they were suppose to express a strong feeling.

Following the general session, the delegated broke into their clubs which they would be working with the remainder of the week. They used name games and interviews to become better acquainted with the members of the club. Then the clubs were given a problem and instructed to find a solution. The club then made a mural to show what they would do to solve the problem.

As Monday came to an end, the delegates gathered on the steps outside the Deneen. Songleader, Dana Gruber, and the J.C.'s lead the songs. Then a Senior Counselor told a story. These nightly closings seemed to bring the delegates closer to each other.

The next four days role playing and group participation were major learning experiences for the delegates. Club activities electing officers, brain storming, areas of authority, constructing a constitution, and "Prisoners Dilemna," a game which teaches a very important lesson about cooperation collaboration, and trust.

The Consultant, Ed Phelps, led all the general assemblies. These included slips,

head bands, broken squares, mipps and wors, the NASA test, a mock meeting, and a leadership style questionnaire. These and other games demonstrated group dynamics, group communication, and con sensus seeking exercises.

In the afternoons around 3:30, the delegates had a chance to show their athletic abilities in the intramurals. There Student Council meetings were also held at this time.

Tuesday evening the J.C.'s led swap shops, Later that evening an "Anything Goes or Jr. Olympics" was held. This brought about the club spirit. Then the delegates went on a Lion Hunt.

Wednesday evening the Senior Counselors held seminars. Then came the Talent Contest, where all of the delegates demonstrated their talented abilities.

Thursday evening the delegates attended a banquet.Student Council President gave the welcome and introduction of the guests.

As the week continued, the delegates found many new acquaintances. The enthusiam at the closing session clearly showed that the delegates were ready to return to their schools and make their student councils more efficient.

As Friday came, no one wanted to go home. They knew it would be a while if ever, when they would see each other again. The IASC Executive Board and Workshop Staffs wish all of these delegates and their councils a successful year.



At the state convention there are many positions available in which students may apply for. These positions include:

**DISCUSSION GROUP LEADERS**- These people organize the group and stimulate constructive discussion among the delegates. This position is very important for the success of the convention largely will depend on how well your discussion group is run.

**DISCUSSION GROUP RECORDER**- These people obtain participant reaction to discussion group. The recorder observes mechanics of group and suggests improve ments in discussion groups that are used for future conventions.

**CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE**- This committee reviews all constitutional amendments submitted to the convention, Reports to the delegation of quality of each amendment.

CREDENTIAL COMMITTEE- Consists of one member from each district. This committee interviews and screens all candidates seeking a position as an IASC officer.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE- This committee screens incoming proposed resolutions for ratification at the convention. The committee is expected to draft resolutions to be submitted to convention delegates.

More detailed letters will be sent to your schools telling you of how you may apply for one of these positions. If you are interested in getting involved in the IASC most important function contact your council advisor and president about applications.


