TAKING STOCK



NATIONAL TRIP INFORMATION!

A Message From The IASC Executive Director, Hank Clark

This year the National Association of Student Councils Conference will be held at Smoky Hill High School in Aurora, Colorado. The conference begins on Saturday, June 27th, with the whole afternoon and evening devoted to meeting your host family. Sunday there will be an opening ceremony Olympic style with each delegation entering the stadium behind the flag. After all the opening ceremony, welcomes, and keynote speaker presentation, the delegation will head for the amusement park. Monday we all head for the University of Colorado for the Point- Counterpoint sessions with the candle lighting session in the mountains that evening. Tuesday will be the workshops put on by the student discussion group leaders, the Interstates, and the Dinner Dance. Wednesday will be the closing with an aerial photograph of the delegation.

For the Illinois delegation, the trip will include a stop in Omaha, Nebraska, with some sight-seeing and then a stop in North Platte, Nebraska before the conference. After the conference we will be visiting Glenwood Springs where we will take a raft trip on the Colorado and go on to Durango with a ride on the narrow gauge railroad to Silverton, and then on to Mesa Verde National Park.

Tentative dates for the trip are Thursday, June 25 through Tuesday, July 7. The cost for the trip including the \$195.00 conference registration fee is \$750.00. The cost will include all meals at the conference, all motels, all admissions and fees for events, and, of course, the bus ride. The fee will not include the cost of food before and after the con conference while the group is touring. I estimate a \$15.00 a day expense for food for about eleven days,

plus any additional money for souvenirs and snacks.

This year the conference officials want to have 75 discussion groups or 25 more than previous years. Last year Illinois provided three discussion group leaders. If there is enough interest Illinois can provide more discussion groups this year. Contact me if you have an idea for a discussion group for the conference.

Please return a completed application with a down payment of \$300.00 by March 15th. Remember your school must be a member of the NASSP (\$65.00 fee) and a school can send no more than four delegates whether it be students or adults. To begin, a school may submit more than one application. However, any applications that are received after the deadline are automatically disqualified. There is a limited amount of space int he display room, so it is impossible to accept everyone. This year one out of every three Hall of Ideas applications had to be rejected for this reason. In some cases, applications from a single school must be limited so that another school has an opportunity to participate. We do our utmost to be fair and impartial.

What can you do? Take the time to make sure that your application is legible, is filled out completely and accurately, and includes a description of your topic that is understandable. When there are two or more applications on the same topic, the one that is neatly and thoughtfully filled out will be accepted.

I hope that my comments have responded to your concerns and will be helpful for the future. If you were not accepted, I encourage you to stay involved, continue your interest in the IASC, and try again next year. For those of you throughout the state who will be attending the convention in May, I invite you to check out the displays. There will be something of interest to everyone, so don't miss them!

Team Italy, Downer's Grove North High School, won the competition, and received three full scholarships to the district convention. All attenders had a wonderful time. This was truly conveyed in one person's evaluation, as they said, "It was better than CATS".

This year, our treasurer has noted that membership is down. In an effort to alleviate this problem, the executive board held a private retreat at Katherine Legge Lodge in Hinsdale, Illinois. At this retreat,

the executive board made personal interviews, which were video taped by a student from Thornwood High School. Each officer describes his or her duties, as well as how a certain event in the district is run. Finally, each officer described their own personal feelings about the district. We also had an interview panel section, with the whole executive board, as well as one with the executive director. With this footage, as well as footage from all forementioned events, we are creating a video yearbook, named "Club NED". We plan to send this video to schools in the district that are not as involved as many of the active schools are and hopefully will encourage non-member schools to join.

In addition to planning all of these events, the district board has worked together to make the year as fun, and as informative as possible. We have held open forum meetings to try to get input from the rest of the district about what we have done, or should be doing. Finally, we have adopted Mr. NED, the new NED mascot.

On February 18th, Palatine High School will be hosting the NED preconvention workshop. This will be a preview of the great things to come at the 1992 NED convention.
