for the Honor Delegate positions annual IASC State Convention.

A record number of freshmen and sophomores applied for Recorder.
Applicants for the positions of Recorder, Discussion Group Leader, and member of the Constitution,
Credentials, Honor Council and Resolutions Committee were also quite numerous as well.

All applicants will receive the outcome of their applications in early Ianuary.

Because of the number of applicants, only a fraction can receive positions. However, the quality of every application was outstanding. Whether the outcome is a position or not, the process of applying has shown the common threads of leadership in all the applicants.

Those accepted as Discussion Group Leaders or members of the Honor Council or Credentials committee are required to attend the Honor Delegate Workshop on April 1, 1995. The Workshop, will be held at Chenoa High School. It prepares DGL's with small-group leadership training and prepares committee members for their duties at the State Convention.

Here is a run-down of what is needed from selected Honor Delegates.

Hall of Ideas Chairs, there are a couple of different guidelines that need to be met. You need to make a poster no larger than 28" x 22" and make a handout on 8 1/2 x 11 paper explaining the events (about 350). There will be no slides or video tapes allowed in your display, because there will be no electricity. (sorry!)

Project School Chairs, you need to compile a ten page type-written booklet with quality printing. These booklets need to contain information that would be useful to schools throughout the state. (Remember, you must contact at least 5 schools out of your district and bring at least 150 booklets to the Convention.)

Special Project school chairs will have individual guidelines, so I'll talk to each of the chairs separately.

For those of you who did get denied, I sincerely appreciate the effort and hope you will apply again in '96.


