# FALL WORKSHOPS

At the 2010 fall workshop in Tuscola, we learned about presentation and communication. It was very well organized and beneficial. Each student had to give a series of presentations which gradually increased in difficulty and length, starting with our "a-b-c's" and progressing to a small persuasive speech.

Following our icebreaker, during which we were able to talk to many of the other students in attendance, we were divided into small groups. We were each told to recite the alphabet to our group in an interesting way to listen to, just as if we were giving a speech to our group. We were then divided into new groups and given a bag of commonplace items and children's toys. Our next task was to sell this item to our groups. We were forced to be creative in order to get a group of high school students to have the desire to buy things such as a wooden block or a fly swatter.

Between our different activities, we learned different tips for giving a successful presentation. One of the most important tips was to be prepared. We also learned to look for feedback in your audience. For instance, the various postures one may be presenting can show their response to what the speaker is saying. Being aware of these things can help you give a better presentation.

We were then divided into yet another group and asked to create an imaginary animal given only its name. We had to describe to our group everything about this animal such as where it lives, what it looks like, what it eats, etc. this was the task that allowed us to be the most creative as we were given very few limitations. For our final task we were given a list of various topics on which we were asked to give our opinions and had to include an introduction, two key points, and a conclusion. All of our previous presentations built up to this final presentation, which made it easier to handle.

By the end of the workshop, we had all improved our presentation and communication skills and had fun doing it.
