RUMSFELD MEETS WITH NATIONAL STUDENT LEADERS

On October 30th, the National Association of Student Councils Advisory Committee, comprised of seven students and seven advisors, one of which was Mr. Burton Showers, Forest View High School director of student activities, met in the Roosevelt Room of the White House with President's Counselor Donald Rumsfeld.

This is the first year that the National Association has been recognized by the President, through the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare as being the official voice of high school students in the country.

Also present at the meeting were Dr. Kiernan, executive secretary for the National Association of Secondary School Principals and Mr. Robert Fitzsimmons, Director of Student Activities on the national level.

One of the main focuses of the national meetings was preparation for the 1972 convention which Forest View will be hosting.

According to Mr. Showers, Mr. Donald Rumsfeld led the meeting for about an hour and a half but was most interested in what the seven students on the board had to say about various national projects in relation to high school participation.

CHICAGO DISTRICT DISSOLVED

At the January Executive Board meeting, Mr. Mel Cohen, adviser from the Chicago District of Student Councils, presented the resolution made by the Chicago Executive Board on January 7, 1972. It is as follows:

"We move that,

"Whereas, the Chicago Board of Education has usurped certain functions of the Chicago District of the IASC by organizing the Inner-School Council, and

"Whereas, this has resulted in the non-participation in the

Chicago District,
'BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED THAT, the Chicago District be dissolved until such time as a viable organization can be created and that the present assets of the organization be placed with the state organization.

Discussion immediately arose concerning the membership to the IASC of the schools in the defunct Chicago District. In answwer to this problem, Mr. Ronald Ganschinietz moved that we add "where one is available" to Article III, Section 1, so that it would read: "Membership in the Illinois High School Association and in the proper district of the IASC, where one is available, shall be prerequisites for membership in the Illinois Association of Student Councils.

NASC TAKES STUDENT "DELEGATES" TO 1972 POLITICAL CONVENTIONS

The year of campaign speeches, promises, and party politics has begun. And for some 11 million young Americans - the newly enfranchised voters - the proceedings will have added significance.

Recognizing the need to directly involve this new voting force in the workings of the political process, the National Association of Student Councils, in cooperation with the Hugh O'Brian Youth Foundation has announced plans to send 57 youth delegates to the 1972 national political conventions.

The young men, one from every state, and seven from United Nations countries will be selected to attend the conventions for a firsthand look at how candidates are selected and how party platforms are developed. In addition, participants will meet informally with party officials and will have the chance to share ideas and opinions with other young people from

across the country.
One half of those selected to participate in the Convention Seminar will visit the Democratic Covention. which starts July 10 in Miami Beach; the other half will be guests at the Republican Convention in San Diego

August 21. All costs, except spending money, will be paid by the Hugh O'Brian Youth Foundation.

Floor credentials for the groups are currently being arranged by Senators Hubert Humphrey of Minnesota and Charles Percy of Illinois.

Eligibility requirements for the 1972 convention seminar are as follows:

Any secondary school student is eligible; however the final selection from each state must be enrolled in a NASC member school.

The participant must be male and shall have completed his sophomore year in June, 1972.


The participant should show evidence of emerging leadership; however, he need not be an elected student body officer.

The participant should be willing to share his experiences with others.

While his grades are not deemed a necessary prerequisite, the participant should generally be in the upper two-thirds of his class.

Selection procedures for those interested in sending a delegate to the seminar are:

- · Local candidates should apply to their student councils.
- Each student council then selects (Continued on next page)



one candidate and submits his name to the state student council secretary by April 1, 1972. The necessary application blanks should be devised by individual councils. Local deadlines may be set by each

the secretary is kept. Each state student council secretary will select a seminar participant and an alternate. Their names must be sent to NASC headquarters by April 15, 1972.




