WELCOME TO THE 57th ANNUAL IASC STATE CONVENTION

SPEAKERS

The IASC Executive Board, in keeping with its tradition of presenting excellent speakers, is proud to introduce this year's keynote speakers, Charley Willey, Rachael Smith and Norm Hull.

On Friday morning delegates will be awakened by Rachael Smith, one of the IASC'S very own. As former 1987-88

Reporter-Editor of the IASC, today Rachael is a junior at Illinois College in Jacksonville, Illinois, studying secondary education and English. Rachael still plays an active role in the IASC by staffing at the Millikin Summer Workshop and speaking at district functions. Having returned from a tour of the Soviet Union in January, Rachael plans to go to Africa next summer to study their educational systems. In the future, Rachael would like to do motivational speaking and work with young people.

On Friday evening, the IASC will have the pleasure of hearing Norm Hull, an International Youth Leadership Consultant and workshop leader. When it comes to student council and leadership experience, Norm Hull is no stranger. Norm's leadership background includes junior and senior high school student body president and leadership camp director for the California Association of Student Councils. Norm Hull enthusiastically encourages others to reach their goals, to develop personal responsibility, and to go out and make a positive difference...at school...at home...in the community...and in the real world!

GENERAL SESSIONS

The opening general session will be held on Thursday night. There will be welcoming remarks, convention updates and committee reports. Some of the highlights will be a key speaker, along with candidates who are running for IASC offices, and campaign speeches.



So You've Gotten Yourself Elected ...What Happens Now???

You just reached that goal you made for yourself this year. You've made campaign buttons, posters and speeches, and you have just been elected to student council. "What should I do next?", you ask yourself. The steps you take can determine the outcome of your year as a leader.

Here are three simple steps to keep in mind as you decide to "make your next move".

Step 1: Write out a list of goals you would like to accomplish for both yourself and your council. Think about ideas you would like to introduce to your council and what you would like to learn from your newly-elected office. Ask yourself, "What can I do to make my office or council more efficient than last year?" Put this list in a special place. Review it periodically to remind yourself of what you have set out to

do.

Step 2: Get out your calendar and begin to plan your activities for the upcoming year. Buy yourself a personal notebook to enter important dates and reminders and keep it with you. Try to set timetables and deadlines for yourself and your council when things need to be done. You will also need to get a copy of your school calendar to take a look at the dates of other school activities to avoid conflicts. After your activity dates are set and approved, make out a large master calendar for your council so that they can see what events are coming up and the deadlines for those events.

Step 3: Meet with your advisors and/ or administration to discuss the upcoming year for your council. Tell them of your plans, goals and new ideas that you would like to accomplish in your council. By making this final step, not only will they know that you are prepared and organized, but you will be starting a positive relationship with your advisors and/or administration—something that will benefit you throughout the year.

By making goals, setting up a calendar, and meeting with your advisors and/or administration, you have just organized the next year for yourself. The step that you take after the first three is to follow through with what you have planned. Coming into any new student council role is never easy. By planning your first steps wisely, you will find yourself on your way to your best year ever in student council!
